About the Organization:

Samata is a social justice organization working for the upliftment of the tribal "Adivasi" people of Andhra Pradesh, India and for the protection of the natural resources and ecology of the Eastern Ghats (hills). Samata started working in a small tribal hamlet in 1987 with a group of tribal and rural youth, to mobilize tribal communities against exploitation by outsiders and by government. Samata was formally registered as a non-government organization in 1990.

Our vision is to help build an India in which tribal and scheduled castes, Adivasi groups, the poor and other disadvantaged minorities can fully participate in a healthy Indian democracy, enjoy the benefits of economic development and retain their rights, their culture, and their history. Our mission is to advocate for the voiceless, to hold government accountable to its promises, to enable minorities to fully achieve and exert their rights, to promote sustainable development while defending against environmental abuses and to aid the human development of the disadvantaged. We believe the best way to achieve our mission is through adherence to nonviolence, community empowerment and adherence to the democratic process. We believe in the possibility for development that advances the cause of social justice instead of undercutting it; in the ability of communities to develop and interact with the environment sustainably instead of exhausting natural resources and destroying ecological systems; in the capacity of tribal communities for self- government and their right to control their own land and resources; in the power of an organized and informed community; in the wisdom and the necessity of pursuing our mission through peaceful and democratic means.

The Pandemic and emergency response:

Samata has been at the frontline to provide relief to the migrant labors, vulnerable and marginalized people affected by the pandemic. With lockdowns in every state being slowly lifted, and the number of cases and deaths spiking, containing the virus has become even more critical. Samata has been tirelessly working on the ground to provide food, rations and hygiene kits to the poor, and also performing the important task of creating awareness about the virus and preventing its spread, educating people on social distancing, helping to combat the stigma, providing shelter and setting up community kitchens for those in need.

a. Awareness

Samata created WhatsApp groups to reach to the tribal population across Andhra Pradesh to generate awareness about the Covid-19 and how to prevent it. Samata made pamphlets and posters to further educate people in the rural interior areas.






Covid-19 Relief: Ration kits distribution to affected families in Visakhapatnam

The Samata Fellowship Program is a move in this direction. We are supporting 20 grassroots fellows in

- Andhra Pradesh,
- Odisha,
- Chhattisgarh,
- Jharkhand and
- West Bengal

The fellows work on range of issues related to health, education, employment generation and upholding Constitutional values and principles. Samata also mentors the fellows as per their need. We have conducted one cross learning event to document best practices and learn from each other.

Samata Social Animators Program

With the idea of supporting social change makers in the tribal villages, Samata instituted the Social Animators program. We support 10 fellows from Andhra Pradesh, Odisha, Chhattisgarh and Jharkhand who wish to bring change and better standard of living in the tribal areas. Social animators have become the first point of contact for the tribal communities for any grievance that they face. Samata has also organized mentorship and training sessions with the social animators to facilitate their activities.

a. Health: Polio Vaccination:

Recognizing the need for timely Polio vaccination, our team conducted awareness drive in the tribal villages in Ananthagiri Mandal for pulse polio vaccine. Children from remote villages took part in it.

b. Livelihood: Eco-tourism management exposure visit:

It is setting an example for sustainable ecotourism. Following this we are conducting Cross Learning Program of various community tourism initiatives in Araku valley.

c. **Education**: Financial support to students

Education support of Rs. 1,04,600/- is granted to Panasala Dwaraka Sai from Doddigonda village in Visakhapattanam who is from the Bhagata Tribe and wish to pursue his B.Sc. in Agricultural Science. Due to her poor background, despite being a bright student, he was

struggling to achieve his dream to pursue a career in Agricultural Sciences from PDM University. After his appeal and proper scrutiny, Panasala was granted the required financial support in her tuition fees and accommodation.

SAMATA has successfully managed to handle the last year of lockdown and also help hundreds of families during the lockdown in 2020! While taking all the precautions.
